The Florida Conference of AC church camps went well and numbers were healthy.

Sr. Camp – 80 campers (27 first timers)

Jr. Camp – 59 campers (28 first timers)

We tried out an online registration process that worked pretty well. We hope to use that for the Youth Retreat in January, which will make it so much easy to register in the future.

On August 30, Dowling Park had a direct

hit from Hurricane Idalia. The damage at camp was devastating. With many trees down, the landscape has changed significantly. Every building had some level of damage to it. Oak 2 and Pine 4 both had a limb come through the roof into the cabin. Praise God no one was hurt! The damage could have been much worse.

The cafeteria was spared from penetration, which is a blessing because the ceiling and lighting were replaced just the day before, thanks to a generous donation.

A huge thank you to longtime Camp Suwannee friends, Tres Dias, for donating their time clearing trees and doing repairs! All the buildings are currently tarped, awaiting new roofs, but it will take some time.

However, we are back up and running.

We are so thankful to all of you who pray for this ministry and support us financially; we couldn't do it without you.

Junior Camp Report

- Two campers were saved.
- Two campers rededicated their lives.
- Two campers were called into ministry.
- 32 campers came forward at an altar call by Stone Robinson. These campers prayed to receive an increase in faith and “level up” their walk with God.
- One camper overcame her fear of public speaking at the Bowl.
- One camper received counsel that she can be forgiven when she makes mistakes.
- At least 24 campers received prayer and counseling for issues including grief, familial fighting, friendship issues, and discerning God's voice.



- One counselor received answers to two separate prayers.

- Two counselors began taking steps toward reconciliation with someone they were previously estranged from.

We were blessed to have Jeannie & Jason Thomas with us for a couple of days before Jeannie's procedure in Jacksonville. The counselors and staff laid hands on Jeannie in prayer before she left, as the campers looked on. Many campers and staff chose to wear a colon cancer awareness blue ribbon, in support of Jeannie on the day of her procedure.

Mrs. Barbara Phipps returned to present a missions class on Tanzania and the Hadzabe tribe (which corresponds nicely to this year's Penny Crusade focus).

Kent and Chrystal Staples returned this year to encourage us with both silly and serious songs. Kent also led a worship class on Monday-Wednesday, (Continued on P.3)
